December 3, 2014, marks the 30th anniversary of the terrible Bhopal gas tragedy, which killed more than 3,000 people almost immediately, another 8,000 in the following days, and more than 20,000 in the last three decades.

Trafficking

Slavery levels in UK 'higher than thought' - BBC

There could be between 10,000 and 13,000 victims of slavery in the UK, higher than previous figures, analysis for the Home Office suggests. Modern slavery victims are said to include women forced into prostitution, "imprisoned" domestic staff and workers in fields, factories and fishing boats.

Punishing sex-trafficking accomplices presents quandary- The Boston Globe

The young woman was trembling as she stood before the judge to plead for mercy. She was guilty of helping her boyfriend sexually exploit a teenager, she acknowledged, but she was also one of his victims.

Meet the nun who helps police raid brothels run by human traffickers- The Guardian

It's Saturday afternoon and in an unmarked police car in central London a burly policeman is accompanied by a tiny, bird-like nun. A raid is about to take place on a brothel whose inhabitants, the police believe, include women who have been trafficked into Britain from eastern Europe. The nun is an integral part of the police operation.

<u>Pope, religious leaders pledge to work together to end slavery by 2020</u>- National Catholic Reporter Vatican City — As Pope Francis and leaders of other churches and religions signed a declaration pledging to work together to help end modern slavery in the world by 2020, he urged governments, businesses and all people of good will to join forces against this "crime against humanity."

English cardinal: Young Africans being seduced into modern slavery- Catholic News Service

Young Africans are being seduced into modern slavery by the promise of a dream that never comes true, an English cardinal told a conference on human trafficking. Cardinal Vincent Nichols of Westminster said "there seems to be no enticement that isn't being used" by human traffickers to entrap children.

Brazil

Brazil indigenous group clashes with police in Congress - BBC

Indigenous leaders say the government of Dilma Rousseff should do more to protect their people. The group, with some 30 men, tried to break into the building to protest against a bill on indigenous lands. Police officers used pepper spray and blocked access to a committee that was due to vote on the proposal.

Congo

DRC: WHO Declares End of Ebola Outbreak- News from Africa

WHO and other partners supported the Government of the Democratic Republic of Congo with expertise for outbreak investigation, a mobile laboratory, risk communications and social mobilization, contact tracing and clinical care.

Haiti

Haiti's Prime Minister Laurent Lamothe resigns after protests - BBC

Mr Martelly was to have called polls in 2011, but they were postponed in a stalemate over electoral law. Opposition politicians accuse President Martelly of wanting to rule by decree and that legislation that would authorise the vote unfairly favours the government.

Japan

Japan election: Voters back Shinzo Abe as PM wins new term - BBC

Japan's ruling coalition has won a new two-thirds majority in parliamentary elections seen as a referendum on Prime Minister Shinzo Abe's economic policy.

Kenya

Gunmen kill dozens in attack on Kenya mine- Al Jazeera

At least 36 people have been killed in an attack on a stone quarry in Mandera, northern Kenya, local sources told Al Jazeera. About 20 gunmen, described by the Kenyan government as "heavily armed bandits" opened fire at the quarry in the early hours of Tuesday morning after separating Muslims and non-Muslims, sources said.

ICC drops Uhuru Kenyatta charges- BBC

Prosecutors at the International Criminal Court (ICC) in The Hague have said they are withdrawing charges against Kenya's leader Uhuru Kenyatta. A statement said the evidence had "not improved to such an extent that Mr Kenyatta's alleged criminal responsibility can be proven beyond reasonable doubt".

Nicaragua

Nicaragua launches construction of inter-oceanic canal - BBC

At an opening ceremony, Wang Jing, the president of HKND, the Chinese company building the canal, said this moment would go down in history. The 278km (172 mile) waterway will be longer, deeper and wider than the Panama Canal. But critics fear a negative environmental impact and doubt its viability and economic benefits.

Nigeria

Scores killed in Nigeria mosque blasts- Al Jazeera

No claim of responsibility yet as two explosions in northern city of Kano kill nearly 100 people and wound scores more. At least 81 people have been killed and 150 others injured after two bombs exploded outside the central mosque of the Nigerian city of Kano.

Political storm warning - Africa Confidential

The opposition is looking stronger but officials are sounding alarms about serious flaws in the election organisation. It has been a good month for the opposition All Progressives Congress. The APC's successful national convention in Lagos picked Muhammadu Buhari as its presidential candidate on 11 December. Combined with unrelenting bad news for President Goodluck Jonathan, that is eating into his incumbent's advantage just two months before general elections. With security and economic conditions the dominant issues, the governing People's Democratic Party is coming under growing pressure from ever more murderous attacks by Boko Haram's Islamist insurgents and the effects of crashing oil prices.

Peru

<u>How One Indigenous Woman Took On a Multinational Mining Corporation... And Won</u> - Common Dreams Indigenous Peruvian farmworker Maxima Acuña de Chaupe withstood violent eviction attempts, beatings, and a legal battle to protect her land from being turned into an open-pit gold mine.

Peru's drive to stamp out people trafficking undermined by high growth - The Guardian

Efforts to help thousands of trafficked children and adults in Peru are being undermined by a strong economy, enduring social and ethnic inequalities, and a lack of awareness, the head of the International Organisation for Migration (IOM) in the country has warned.

South Africa is a source, transit, and destination country for men, women, and children subjected to forced labor and sex trafficking. South African citizens and foreign nationals are subjected to human trafficking within the country.

Zimbabwe's vice president has been ousted from the ruling party's leadership after a sustained campaign led by Robert Mugabe's wife Grace, as the battle to succeed the long-serving president heats up.

USA

When the City Turned Off Their Water, Detroit Residents and Groups Delivered Help- YES Magazine The Detroit water-rights movement really got into gear when Charity Hicks was taken to jail while trying to stop shut-offs on her block. "It started a windstorm of people rising up and speaking out, knowing what was happening regarding the water," says Detroit poet and activist Tawana Petty. "She was always instrumental in the water struggle but her personal experience brought it home to everyone."
