Texas oil town makes history as residents say no to fracking -The Guardian

The Texas town where America's oil and natural gas boom began has voted to ban fracking, in a stunning rebuke to the industry. Denton, a college town on the edge of the Barnett Shale, voted by 59% to ban fracking inside the city limits, a first for any locality in Texas.

<u>Industry Lashes Out With Lawsuit Hours After Landmark Fracking Ban</u> - Common Dreams

Mere hours after voters in Denton, Texas made history by enacting the state's first ban on fracking, the oil and gas industry has challenged that move with a lawsuit. Supporters say the ban, which passed with the support of nearly 59 percent of voters, said it was necessary to protect the city from the polluting and dangerous process.

The Philippines: stop the palm oil rush in Palawan - Rainforest Rescue

Brazil

Brazil carbon emissions rise for the first time since 2004 -report - Reuters

Brazil's annual greenhouse gas emissions increased last year for the first time since 2004 after years of reductions as deforestation and the use of thermal power plants rose, a new study found.

Rousseff faces obstacles in new term - Latin America Press

President proposes political reform to broaden citizen representation, which would affect rural and business interests in the legislature.

Congo

WHO (World Health Organization) Declares End of Ebola Outbreak - NewsfromAfrica

WHO and other partners supported the Government of the Democratic Republic of Congo with expertise for outbreak investigation, a mobile laboratory, risk communications and social mobilization, contact tracing and clinical care.

Japan

Survivors Pulled From Ruins After Quake in Japan - New York Times

Police officers and firefighters rescued almost two dozen people, including a 2-year-old toddler, from beneath their collapsed houses on Sunday, a day after a powerful earthquake shook mountainous central Japan. At least 40 people were injured, but no deaths were reported.

Growing Coral to Keep a Sea Claim Above Water - New York Times

Amid warnings that rising sea levels caused by global warming could lead to the disappearance of some entire island states, two tiny uninhabited islets in the Pacific are at the forefront of Japanese research into the preservation and regeneration of coral reefs.

Kenya

Kenya moves to rein in solar cowboys - The East African

By mid-2015 Kenya should have around 580 certified technicians, including those trained by the government and others who have gotten qualified on their own. That number should grow to about 1,000 by 2016. The government knows that if it is going to motivate more Kenyans to install solar-energy systems in their homes and businesses, it not only needs to increase the number of trained technicians but also make it harder for untrained installers to undercut them.

Kenyan Police arrest 109 in new raids on Mombasa mosques - The East African

Police in Kenya's coastal city of Mombasa raided two mosques and arrested more than 100 people about a day after taking 251 people into custody during a swoop on two other mosques in the port city.

Nicaragua

Giant canal threatens way of life on the banks of Lake Nicaragua - The Telegraph

Plans for Nicaraguan canal which would dwarf its Panama rival and dissect central America's largest lake met with violent resistance from locals

Nigeria

Nigeria: More than 50,000 Violence-Displaced People in North-East Get Aid - NewsfromAfrica

Most displaced people who arrived in Maiduguri in the past few months were settled in government buildings, schools or official camps. Some stayed with relatives or host families, with whom they shared scant resources, while others found refuge in informal settlements.

Bring Back Our Journalists - Foreign Policy

There was never any cease-fire. War in Nigeria will not end anytime soon and the hundreds of schoolgirls from the northeastern town of Chibok kidnapped back in April will not — not now, maybe not ever — be coming home. So announces the leader of Boko Haram, the militant group that has brought all this havoc to the country, in a video released Oct. 31.

Remember Ken Saro-Wiwa and the Ogoni Nine - EarthRights International

On November 10, 1995, internationally renowned author and human rights and environmental activist Ken Saro-Wiwa and eight other Ogoni men were hung in Port Harcourt, Nigeria. Arrested and held for months without charges, tortured while under detention, and sentenced to death by a "Special Tribunal" convened in violation of international law.

Peru

New Research Points to Vast Deforestation in Peru - Peruvian Times

New research by the Lima-based Instituto del Bien Comun, a non-governmental organization that promotes indigenous rights and environmental stewardship, has found that 1.42 million hectares (3.5 million acres) have been deforested in the Peruvian Amazon.

South Africa

South Sudan

South Sudan's first female mayor murdered, bishops plead for peace - The Tablet

Yei Diocese in South Sudan has condemned the brutal murder of the first female mayor of Yei City. Fr Zachariah Angutuwa Sebit, Vicar General of Yei Diocese, said it was an act against the people. Cecilia Oba Tito, who was killed on 9 November near Juba, participated in drafting the Constitution of South Sudan and in 2013 was elected mayor of Yei, a post she stepped down from in September. She was an active Christian, especially championing women's access to education.

Zimbabwe

Uproar over Harare demolitions - IRIN

Thousands of residents in Zimbabwe's capital Harare and surrounding areas are facing eviction from their homes as local authorities embark on an operation to demolish all illegal structures. At the end of last month, city authorities turned 70 residential and business buildings into rubble overnight in the dormitory town of Chitungwiza, 25km north of Harare, and served 324 settlers in the high-density suburb of Glen Norah with 48-hour eviction notices. However, the demolitions in Glen Norah did not proceed, as residents armed with axes, knobkerries and other objects faced off with police who eventually retreated.

USA

<u>Drop That Plate Right Now: Cops Arrest 90-Year-Old Advocate and Clergy For Scary Crime of Feeding the Hungry</u> Common Dreams

Bound by faith and virtue to resist newly passed "homeless hate laws" in Fort Lauderdale, a 90-year-old homeless advocate and two ministers were arrested by a phalanx of burly cops for resolutely continuing to share food with homeless people in public, part of a "week of resistance" to a growing body of laws there and in at least 20 other cities that criminalize poor people by restricting their panhandling, camping, storing belongings, going to the bathroom and other activities deemed "life sustaining" to the homeless – that is, essentially, for existing.

Ten-year-old Andrés Jiménez was looking forward to the end of summer. Not because he was particularly eager to return to school, but because the end of summer was meant to be the president's deadline for taking action on immigration. They contribute to the production of about 120 goods from 58 countries, with an estimated \$15.5 billion made in wealthy industrialized countries. Our greater purpose should be "to build a civilization based on the equal dignity of every person without discrimination. To achieve this will also require the commitment of the media, of education, and of culture to a renewed society pledged to freedom, justice, and therefore peace." Visit www.combonisouthsudan.org.

April
