UNITED NATIONS, September, 15 2014 (IPS) – The much-ballyhooed one-day Climate Summit next week is being hyped as one of the major political-environmental events at the United Nations this year. Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon has urged over 120 of the world's political and business leaders, who are expected to participate in the talk-fest, to announce significant and substantial initiatives, including funding commitments, "to help move the world towards a path that will limit global warming.

Amazon rainforest destruction in Brazil rises again- BBC

The rate of destruction of the Amazon rainforest in Brazil has increased for a second year running. Brazilian government figures show deforestation was up by 29% in the 12 months up to the end of July 2013. Satellite data showed that almost 6,000 sq km (2,315 sq miles) of forest were cleared during that period.

The People's Climate March: Meet the Next Movement of Movements-Common Dreams

The most important climate gathering next week will not be happening at the UN, but in the streets: thousands upon thousands of us will be sounding the climate alarm, literally, at the historic People's Climate March on September 21. While the decision was made not to have speeches during the march, at 12:58pm there will be two minutes of silence followed by the unleashing of a chorus of magnificent sound—part of what organizers are describing as a global call for climate justice—complete with church bells and some 32 marching bands.

The bankruptcy process could make it more difficult for hold-out investors to block countries from debt restructuring and could limit future defaults.

Peace

Syria: Bishop says US air raids 'could worsen the situation' - Independent Catholic News

The Armenian Catholic Archbishop of Aleppo, Boutros Marayati, says the air raids against jihadi bases in Syria, carried out by the United States with the support of some Arab countries, are not being welcomed by the local population. They don't see the bomber as liberators People are afraid "that this type of external involvement could worsen the situation" he said.

Libya migrant boat sinks: Scores feared drowned-BBC

Many migrants have drowned while trying to reach Europe after their boat sank off Libya, the Libyan navy says. Navy spokesman Ayub Qassem said 36 people had been rescued after the vessel – which carried 250 – went down near Tajoura, east of Tripoli. "There are so many dead bodies floating in the sea," Mr Qassem told reporters.

WASHINGTON (CNS) — The conflict in which Islamic State fighters are driving out Christians and other minorities must not be seen as a war between Islam and Christianity, said the head of the Vatican Congregation for Eastern Churches. "I do not share this position and I ask, on the contrary, that it never prevail," Cardinal Leonardo Sandri told participants in the inaugural In Defense of Christians summit Sept. 9.

<u>Irish Bishop halts plan for Permanent Diaconate after women protest</u> - Independent Catholic News The bishop of one of the largest dioceses in Ireland, has put on hold plans to introduce the Permanent Diaconate, after consulting with Pastoral Leadership groups, several of whom had protested that many functions of the proposed deaconate are already being performed by laywomen - who cannot apply to become deacons.

Act now to end child slavery in the chocolate industry - Sent by Mary Jo McCallum, SNDdeN

Much of the chocolate we enjoy may be tainted by child slavery. Anti-Slavery International's latest research shows the continuation of child trafficking, a form of modern slavery, to cocoa farms in the Ivory Coast, which produces almost 40% of the world's cocoa. Instead of going to school young boys are forced to spend long days hacking open cocoa pods with machetes, handling dangerous pesticides and carrying

heavy loads - work that is deemed extremely hazardous, can lead to injury and ill-health, and that no young child should have to do.

Brazil

Brazil builds giant Amazon observation tower-BBC

Construction has begun on a giant observation tower in the heart of the Amazon basin to monitor climate change. The Amazon Tall Tower Observatory is expected to rise 325m from the ground. Its instruments will gather data on greenhouse gases, aerosol particles and the weather in one of the largest continuous rain forests on the planet.

Brazil election: Economy at heart of battle-BBC

It is not the kind of economic background Brazilian President Dilma Rousseff must have hoped for in her run for re-election. Just five weeks before the voting that will take place on 5 October, it was announced that Brazil had fallen into a recession earlier this year.

<u>Sister Dorothy Stang's killer rearrested, linked to three murders</u> - Catholic News Service Rayfran das Neves Sales, the convicted killer of U.S. Sister Dorothy Stang, was arrested Sept. 19. He was accused of being involved in the murders of three people in the northern state of Para. Sales served a little less than eight years of a 27-year sentence for shooting Sister Dorothy, a member of the Notre Dame de Namur Sisters who had U.S. and Brazilian citizenship.

Congo

Fifty-four-year-old Marlyn Maeda, an unmarried freelance writer living in Tokyo who never held a permanent job, is now watching her dream of aging independently go up in smoke. "I work four jobs and barely survive," said the writer, who disclosed only her penname to IPS. Her monthly income after writing articles, working at a call centre, selling cosmetics five days a week and working one night at a bar hovers at close to 1,600 dollars.

Kenya

Chaos in Kisumu as traders protest demolition of stalls- Daily Nation

Business was disrupted in Kisumu on Saturday morning after youths blocked roads leading to the town to protest the demolition of stalls at Oile market by the county government. For over an hour, Kisumu was a nogo zone as traders lit fires on the main roads leading to the town and stoned shops near the market.

Kenya: Nairobi Meeting to Discuss Food Security Challenges- News from Africa

The meeting preceding World Day on October 16, will debate why Kenya, like many African countries, are dependent on food imports, unable to feed its people on domestic production alone. This is despite Africa's abundant land and resources.

Nicaragua

While the specific history of Nicaragua has much to do with the lack of violence, its police system, dubbed "a new security paradigm" by some, could offer ways forward for its more violent neighbors.

Nigeria

Nigerian bishop says Boko Haram murdered 2,500 in his diocese - Catholic News Agency

Bishop Oliver Dashe Doeme of Maiduguri has denounced the militant Islamist group Boko Haram for the murders of more than 2,500 faithful in his Nigerian diocese. He is currently taking refuge in the Nigerian state of Adamawa, together with thousands of faithful, Fides news agency reports. The bishop denounced Boko Haram in an interview with the newspaper ThisDay.

Peru

Four Peruvian anti-logging activists murdered-BBC

Illegal logging in the Amazon rainforest has pushed many indigenous people out of their ancestral land. Four Peruvian tribal leaders have been killed on their way to a meeting to discuss ways to stop illegal logging. The men from the Ashaninka community were attempting to travel to Brazil when they were murdered.

Peru creates new anti-logging commission after murders - BBC

The Peruvian government says it will investigate illegal logging along the Peru-Brazil border following the murder of four indigenous leaders. The leaders were killed in early September, allegedly by loggers. The Peruvian President of the Council of Ministers, Ana Jara Velasquez, announced a commission which she said would have powers to stop the logging.
