So far, he hasn't formally announced that he will be standing. Before that happens, his campaign team will have to shore up support across the party nation-wide.

The country is still reverberating from the shooting of 34 mineworkers at Marikana a year ago. Yet the common complaint from the people in the area at a commemoration on 16 August concerned the lack of help from the government for the relatives of the deceased. At the the memorial, attended by civic activists and trades unionists, African National Congres leaders were conspicuous by their absence. This seems to underline the growing schism between the governing ANC and its former union allies. In the short term, it could help President Jacob Zuma win re-election next year by weakening his trades-union opponents. Certainly, he seems to have emerged as the winner in his long-running battle with Zwelinzima Vavi, the General Secretary of the Congess of South African Trades Unions (Cosatu).

South Sudan

Kiir Needs to Tread Cautiously - News from Africa

After more than two decades of a bruising battle with its neighbour Sudan, South Sudan, Africa's newly independent state should tread cautiously to avoid a civil war which is now looming large following power struggles within the ruling SPLM. The country cannot afford to go to war when it still has unfinished business with Sudan, including the disputed oil-rich region of Abyei.

Kiir Appoints New Cabinet - Newsfromafrica

A presidential creed said that Mr Kiir had appointed 10 ministers to his new smaller cabinet, slashing by a third the number of the post from the previous team. However, the key post of vice-president is yet to be filled after Mr Machar's dismissal.

Oil Politics, Asian Suitors, and Alternative Pipelines in South Sudan - ThinkAfrica Press

According to South Sudanese officials, the Japanese Toyota Company has agreed to build a new oil pipeline that bypasses Sudan.

Zimbabwe

As a second commissioner from the Zimbabwe Electoral Commission (ZEC) resigns, local opposition parties and analysts are questioning the organisation's credibility and President Robert Mugabe's victory.

Leaders of the 15-member Southern African Development Community (SADC) meeting in Lilongwe on 18 August overwhelmingly endorsed the re-election of Robert Mugabe as Zimbabwe's President last month. Their task was made easier by the decision of the Movement for Democratic Change to withdraw its petition to Harare's Constitutional Court claiming massive vote-rigging and falsification of the electoral register. The MDC claimed it would have been impossible to fight their case as the Electoral Commission had failed to give it the results data it had requested. Now the focus may move to the economic consequences of President Mugabe's victory.


