They spoke no English, but they could watch television. Soon, they figured out that dialing 911 on the telephone would bring police.

## Environment

The commoditization of water and its social impact - EchoJesuit

## Brazil

Descendants of Slaves Report Military Abuses in Brazil - InterPress Service Residents of the small community of Rio dos Macacos, made up of descendants of slaves in the northeastern Brazilian state of Bahia, reported to United Nations bodies that they were attacked by military personnel from the Aratu naval base, which occupies part of their land.

Gang war in Brazil's Pedrinhas jail kills 59 in 2013 - BBC
Fifty-nine inmates have been killed in a single northern Brazilian prison this year, according to a judicial report. Video taken inside the Pedrinhas prison in Sao Luis also shows the torture of one inmate at the hands of others - and cases of beheadings. The district judge who wrote the report said the video was the "most barbarous scene" he had ever witnessed.

## Congo

Kinshasa: Heavy gunfire, hostage scenario wreaks panic among residents - Mail and Guardian Residents in the capital of the DRC have been left to feel uneasy after gunfire erupted throughout the city and several reporters were taken hostage.

Constitution's Article 9 revisited - Maryknoll Office of Global Concerns
With the geo-political shifts in Asia and last year's return to power of the conservative Liberal Democratic Party in Japan, a real possibility exists of changing Article 9 of Japan's Constitution which had been written during the Occupation Period after World War II. Article 9 is found in the second
chapter of the constitution, "Renunciation of war"; its English translation states: Aspiring sincerely to an international peace based on justice and order, the Japanese people forever renounce war as a sovereign right of the nation and the threat or use of force as means of settling international disputes. In order to accomplish the aim of the preceding paragraph, land, sea, and air forces, as well as other war potential, will never be maintained. The right of belligerency of the state will not be recognized.

## Kenya
